Call to Order and Welcome

The meeting of the Judicial Council of Georgia (Council) was called to order at 10:01 a.m. by Chief Justice Thompson. Members and designees identified themselves for the purposes of roll call, followed by staff and guests. The following judges were recognized as designees (with voting privileges) for absent members: Judge Jack Partain (for Judge S. Lark Ingram), Judge Richard Kent (for Judge Wayne M. Purdom) and Judge James Griner (for Judge Robert Turner).

Adoption of Minutes – December 9, 2015

Chief Justice Thompson directed the Council's attention to the minutes of the December 9, 2015, meeting. A motion to approve was offered by Judge Weaver, followed by a second from Judge Padgett. No discussion was offered and the motion passed with no opposition.

Child Support Collaborative/Parental Accountability Courts/Child Support E-filing

Ms. Buonodono, Staff Attorney for the Georgia Commission on Child Support and the Director of the Georgia Child Support Collaborative project, presented on behalf of Judge Louisa Abbot. She provided background of this partnership between the judicial and executive branches, noted current work to develop an online version of the Child Support Calculator, and spoke to pending legislation in Senate Bill 64. Judge Brian Amero (Superior Court, Flint Judicial Circuit, and presiding judge of the Henry County Parental Accountability Court) discussed the model and benefits of Parental Accountability Courts. The mission of these courts is to provide an alternative option to individuals who are behind on child support payments. Ms. Beverly Logan (Clerk of Superior Court, Athens-Clarke County) spoke on the benefits of using the child support e-filing system, known as Georgia Judicial Exchange (GAJE).

Committee Reports

Strategic Plan Implementation Committee. Chief Judge Doyle referred to the written report provided in the materials. The Committee met on February 9 to continue discussions on communications. As the Committee approaches the end of its three year term, it is discussing the Council's membership and committee structure. A new Strategic Plan Standing Committee has been created, and the Committee has started its work early with the intent that the overlap will assist in the formulation of the next strategic plan. Included in the materials are a proposed Order regarding the Council's membership that has been submitted to the Supreme Court for consideration; this proposal adds a representative of the State Bar as a non-voting member. Judge

Doyle requested that any feedback be directed to the Chief Justice. Proposed amendments to the Council bylaws were also included in the materials; these proposals seek to clarify the definitions of “standing” and “ad hoc” committees and to add a mechanism to make amendments to the bylaws more flexible. Judge Doyle requested that feedback on these proposals be directed to Ms. Clanton by March 25. Chief Justice Thompson recognized Mr. Patrick O’Connor, President-Elect of the State Bar, who indicated the Bar’s favor of the membership proposal.

Technology Committee. Justice Harold Melton reported that the Technology Committee continues to work on the e-filing portal implementation. The report has been received from the National Center for State Courts and meetings with vendors will be held soon.

Budget Committee. Justice Melton reported the progress of this year’s appropriations process. He summarized the results of the Amended Fiscal Year 2016 budget, including the one-time reduction to the Council budget. Justice Melton reported that all but two of the Council’s enhancement requests for Fiscal Year 2017 had been supported in the House and the hope for a favorable response from the Senate.

Policy and Legislative Committee. Justice Hines referred to the written report provided in the materials. He reviewed the status of each item in the Council’s legislative package and spoke to the details of several. Justice Hines spoke briefly on Senate Bill 332 (which is not a Judicial Council bill), sponsored by Sen. John Kennedy and which provides for state identification cards for judges. Judge Tilman Self was recognized and stated work is ongoing on this bill. Ms. Butcher was recognized for additional remarks and she highlighted several other bills of interest to the Council. Chief Justice Thompson thanked Justice Hines, the Committee, and all who have participated for their efforts to work together on behalf of the judiciary.

Judicial Workload Assessment Committee. Judge David Emerson referred to the written report provided in the materials. He presented an overview of the workload assessment process and emphasized that data obtained from the assessment can be influential in state legislative issues. Judge Emerson announced that the Committee will be conducting a “time and motion” study and encouraged all superior court judges to participate. Training is available to assist courts with this data; interested judges can contact Mr. Hansard with the Administrative Office of the Courts or himself. Judge Emerson concluded by stating that the work the Committee seeks to report is complex and the Committee’s goal is to have accurate numbers.

The Chief Justice called for a break at 11:11 a.m. The meeting reconvened at 11:24 a.m.

Supreme Court Commission on Interpreters

Mr. Morokuma presented on behalf of Justice Keith Blackwell and the Commission. The Commission recently produced a bench card, “Working With Limited English Proficient Persons and Foreign Language Interpreters in the Court Room,” which is being distributed to all classes of court and was provided in the materials. This is meant to serve as a companion to the “Working with Deaf or Hard of Hearing Persons and Sign Language Interpreters in the Courtroom” bench card, which was presented to the Council last August. The Commission hopes this resource will help judges and staff manage any language access issues that may come up and welcomes any feedback.

Report from Judicial Council/AOC

Ms. Clanton thanked everyone for providing feedback on the AOC’s performance and reported on the agency’s recent and current activities.

The pilot phase of the Tax Refund Intercept Program (TRIP) is progressing well and media coverage on the program has been positive. Ms. Clanton acknowledged Mr. Dennis for his continued effort in ensuring successful participation and thanked Judge Jackson for his positive remarks made in a recent *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* article.

Ms. Clanton spoke to the AOC’s new communications plan, which aims to utilize new tools and other methods to help foster communication and share information amongst the Council. Staff from the Office of Research and Data Analysis has been travelling across the state to train courts on workload assessments. Ms. Clanton introduced Ms. Hardnett as the new Program Manager of Research and Data Analysis and also introduced Ms. Smith, Executive Assistant, who will be coordinating Judicial Council meetings going forward. Ms. Clanton informed the Council of her recent court visits, as she is working diligently to observe judges in court as they help solve people’s problems.

Reports from Appellate Courts and Trial Court Councils

Supreme Court. Chief Justice Thompson referred members to the written report provided in the materials. He thanked all who contributed information for the State of the Judiciary Address and indicated his hope that the judiciary’s work would be appreciated by the legislature. He spoke to the work of the Appellate Jurisdiction Review Commission and the legislation resulting from its recommendations.

Court of Appeals. Chief Judge Doyle reported that the Court welcomed three new judges in January. Internal testing will be conducted to determine if the Court has the ability to accept trial court records electronically. An update will be provided at the April Council meeting.

Council of Superior Court Judges. Judge Weaver referred members to the written report provided in the materials. Judge Weaver informed the Council of the passing of two former judges, Judge Walter C. McMillan and Judge Thomas K. Kilpatrick.

Council of State Court Judges. Judge Slaby spoke to the new State Court of Catoosa County and the anticipated judicial appointment.

Council of Juvenile Court Judges. Judge Sumner reported on the appointment of three new juvenile court judges: Judge Warren C. Caswell (Northern Judicial Circuit), Judge Neal Brunt (Cherokee Judicial Circuit) and Judge Joe Raymond Diaz (Northeastern Judicial Circuit). He also noted that Governor Deal has accepted a statewide grant for the national Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI). JDAI would provide alternative options for juveniles in lieu of detention. A Statewide Coordinator has been hired and six pilot sites are anticipated to be in place by the fall. Judge Sumner expressed excitement about continuing work with the Council of Accountability Court Judges.

Council of Probate Court Judges. Judge Wilkes referred members to the written report provided in the materials. He highlighted the opportunities and challenges his council was tasked with this past year. The Council has hosted seven training sessions with the Office of Vital Records since January 1 and, to much success, hosted Probate Court Day at the Capitol on Tuesday of this week. Judge Wilkes noted that this was his last meeting and stated that it was an honor to work with so many distinguished judges. Chief Justice Thompson commended Judge Wilkes for his leadership of the Council.

Council of Magistrate Court Judges. Judge Blum reported that Magistrate Day at the Capitol, held February 3, was very well attended and received. The Council's Executive Committee has met once in the new year. The recertification seminars scheduled for April and October will include plenary sessions on the new garnishment law; Judge Blum thanked the Institute of Continuing Judicial Education for assisting in this change to the curriculum. Judge Blum also noted updates to the Council's website and Forms Wizard will include new garnishment forms.

Council of Municipal Court Judges. Judge Jones referred members to the written report provided in the materials. She thanked the AOC for assisting with the Crisis Media Guidelines Bench card. Judge Jones will be traveling to Alabama to speak to the Alabama League of Municipalities on Georgia's model on pretrial probation services.

Report from the Council of Superior Court Clerks

A written report was provided in the materials. Chief Justice Thompson recognized Ms. Tina Blankenship, who reported that the Council is moving forward with the Document Access Portal.

Report from the Council of Accountability Court Judges

Ms. Jones referred members to the written report provided in the materials and provided a brief update on the Council's current activities. The Council is now fully staffed and the Fiscal Year 2017 grant has been released.

Report from the Georgia Council of Court Administrators

Mr. BeMent referred the members to the written report provided in the materials. He expressed appreciation to the Council for its support of GCCA's budget enhancement request.

Old Business

No old business was offered.

New Business

No new business was offered.

Concluding Remarks

Chief Justice Thompson presented Judge Wilkes with a certificate of appreciation and thanked him for his service on the Council. He also recognized that, as Judge Altman would not be able to attend the April meeting, this would be his last meeting as a member of the Council as well.

The Chief Justice announced that the previously scheduled meeting for June 15 will not take place.

Adjournment

Hearing no further business, Chief Justice Thompson adjourned the meeting at 12:10 p.m.

On March 29, 2016, the Strategic Plan Implementation Committee (SPI) met to discuss its final action items related to priority initiative 6 - composition of Judicial Council committees. Members of the newly appointed Judicial Council Strategic Plan Standing Committee also attended the meeting to continue the transfer of strategic planning efforts and knowledge.

Action Item:

At its February 26, 2016 meeting, the SPI Committee presented the Judicial Council with proposed amendments to the Judicial Council Bylaws and asked for comments. Having received no negative comments, the SPI Committee requests that the Judicial Council approve the proposed amendments to the Judicial Council Bylaws. The amendments define the general purpose of standing and ad hoc committees, streamline their composition and allow the Council Chair to accept proposed amendments to Bylaws if Council members are afforded at least sixty (60) days' notice prior to the final regular meeting of the fiscal year. The proposed amendments to the Bylaws are attached.

Informational Item:

At its recent meeting, the SPI Committee discussed Judicial Council committee composition including membership, mission and terms. The SPI Committee has concluded its work on composition of Judicial Council committees and intends to submit its recommendations to the Supreme Court for its consideration. The Committee Recommendations include establishing nine Judicial Council committees as standing committees, establishing one ad hoc committee and abolishing two inactive Judicial Council committees. The Committee Recommendations address membership, mission and terms for the nine Judicial Council standing committees and one ad hoc committee. The Judicial Council Committee Recommendations are attached. **If you have any comments about the recommendations, please send them to Cynthia Clanton on or before**

May 13, 2016.

The final meeting of the SPI Committee will be May 24, 2016 at the State Bar of Georgia. The newly appointed Standing Committee will also be invited to attend.

ARTICLE IV: COMMITTEES

Standing Committees

Standing Committees exist to address issues of ongoing, long-term importance to the Council. Standing Committees and their memberships shall be determined by Supreme Court order. Ad-Hoc Committees

Ad-Hoc Committees exist to address issues of limited scope and duration. Ad-Hoc Committees

The Council Chair shall create and charge name ad-hoc committees as are necessary to conduct the business of the Council.¹ Committee membership may include advisory members appointed, as needed, by each Ad-Hoc Committee Chair. ~~The Chair of the Council shall appoint the chairs of the ad-hoc committees who shall be current or past Council members. Introduction

As part of its work on Priority Initiative 6, the Strategic Plan Implementation Committee (Committee) discussed the composition of the Judicial Council and its committees. At its March 2016 meeting, the SPI Committee recommended a list of committees, including their mission, membership, and terms, be submitted to the Judicial Council and Supreme Court for their consideration. This memo includes those recommendations and related documents the Council and Court may find useful during their deliberative process.

Recommendations

The SPI Committee recommends that the Supreme Court establish the following Judicial Council Standing Committees pursuant to Judicial Council Bylaws.¹

- Standing Committee on Legislation
- Standing Committee on Budget
- Standing Committee on Strategic Planning
- Standing Committee on Technology
- Standing Committee on Access, Fairness, and Public Trust and Confidence
- Standing Committee on Judicial Workload Assessment

- Standing Committee on Court Reporting Matters
- Standing Committee on Grants
- Standing Committee on Education and Training

For consistency, the committee names have been standardized and may differ from recent Supreme Court orders and common parlance. Standing committee advisory members are listed here to memorialize current practice and recommend advisory members to committee chairs. Under the proposed Judicial Council Bylaw amendments, committee chairs would have the authority to appoint advisory members at their discretion. However, the Supreme Court and/or the Judicial Council Chair may choose to include these advisory members in their orders/charges establishing each committee. With the exception of standing committees whose members serve ex-officio, all other committee terms have been standardized to three years beginning July 1, though initial member terms may be staggered to maintain membership continuity and institutional knowledge.

The SPI Committee recommends that the Judicial Council Chair establish the following Judicial Council Ad Hoc Committees pursuant to Judicial Council Bylaws.²

- Ad Hoc Committee on Records Retention

The SPI Committee recommends that the Supreme Court abolish the following Judicial Council Standing Committees pursuant to Judicial Council Bylaws.

- Standing Committee on Administration
- Nominating Committee

A detailed list of the Standing Committee membership and terms, along with staff comments, are included in Attachment A. Attachment B includes templates for Supreme Court orders and ad hoc committee charges that can be used to implement the committee recommendations.



This memo will provide an update on Amended Fiscal Year 2016 and Fiscal Year 2017 budget requests as well as outline next steps for Amended Fiscal Year 2017 and Fiscal Year 2018 budget cycles.

Fiscal Year 2016: The Judicial Council received \$15,711,761 in State Appropriations for Fiscal Year 2016. A budget amendment totaling \$984,348 was completed for the transfer of the County and Municipal Probation Advisory Council and Georgia Commission on Family Violence to the Department of Community Supervision, reducing the Judicial Council Fiscal Year 2016 budget to \$14,427,413. (HB 310)

A Fiscal Year 2016 overview highlighting Judicial Council expenditures through March 31 is attached.

Amended Fiscal Year 2016: The Council of State Court Judges received funding for JRS/ERS retirement obligations. The Institute of Continuing Judicial Education request for a position was not funded. The attached report outlines the adjustments received. In total, the Judicial Council budget was reduced by \$13,289 to \$14,414,124.

Fiscal Year 2017: The Judicial Council submitted ten enhancement requests for consideration to the General Assembly. Seven were supported and six were funded. The attached report outlines enhancements and adjustments impacting the budget. In total, the Judicial Council budget was increased by \$324,405 to \$14,751,818.

Amended Fiscal Year 2017 and Fiscal Year 2018: The Judicial Council Budget Committee will accept White Papers for these budget cycles from May 1 – June 15. The Committee will meet in July to review all requests for funding. Requests supported by the Committee will be presented to the Judicial Council at the August meeting. Those approved by the Judicial Council will be submitted to the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget prior to the September 1 deadline.

The Communications, Children, Families and the Courts Division of the AOC serves as the hub of all communications and provides staff for the Supreme Court of Georgia Committee on Justice for Children, chaired by Presiding Justice P. Harris Hines; the Georgia Commission on Child Support, currently awaiting the appointment of a new Chair; and the Access, Fairness, Public Trust and Confidence Committee of the Judicial Council, co-chaired by Justice Robert Benham and Justice Carol Hunstein; as well as any grant funded work related to children and families. Seeking grants for courts is a new service just added within this division and may expand if the return on investment is deemed to be positive.

In addition, this staff also serves as a liaison to the Georgia Commission on Family Violence (GCFV), chaired by Holly Tuchman, and the Council of Accountability Courts with Judge Jason Deal as its current President.

Following is a brief synopsis of the work.

- **Committee on Justice for Children (J4C):** The staff of the J4C are working in partnership with many executive branch agencies on the Cold Case Project (reviews of foster children's cases by lawyers) which is now being institutionalized as a project with state funding as opposed to grant funding. The J4C Committee met on April 22, 2016, to decide the funding priorities of the new federal grant and to discuss improvements for Georgia's child welfare system. Implementation of those discussed and decided plans will drive the work in 2016/2017.
- **Communications:** Improving communications for internal and external judicial branch audiences is a priority under the Judicial Council Strategic Plan. A communication plan created in 2015 is now being implemented. Daily and periodic tasks within Communications include working on writing the JC/AOC Annual Report, publishing the quarterly Courts Journal; maintaining the Georgia Courts Directory; assisting with drafting and distribution of press

releases; updating Judicial Council materials; providing substantive content for our Facebook/Twitter and georgiacourts.gov; taking photos and drafting daily messages for events and communications. For the month of March, which was Women's History Month, the staff posted profiles of women judges. See: <https://www.facebook.com/GACourts> and some examples below.

- **Child Support Commission:** Most recently, the Child Support Commission supported legislation seeking to repeal administrative legitimation, which is now before the Governor. Staff works collaboratively with DHS on the Parental Accountability Courts, training court coordinators on use of the database that will give us statistical evidence of the efficacy of those courts. Pat Buonodono and Elaine Johnson serve on the Parental Accountability Court Subcommittee of the Accountability Courts Advisory Council. Current work also includes development of a new on-line child support calculator along with user guides; training throughout the state on child support, income deduction, and other related subjects; and responding to questions from judges, attorneys and the public on a daily basis.
- **Access, Fairness, and Public Trust and Confidence Committee:** Contract attorney, Karlise Grier, is preparing to staff the next Committee meeting to be held on May 11, 2016. Topics will include: a new Georgia ADA handbook; a (2017) National Association of Women Judges conference; a submitted grant proposal to host a Human Trafficking and the Courts Summit; a recent letter from the U.S. Department of Justice regarding fines and fees by courts and continuing discussions around the Ferguson report and court-based self-help programs.
- **Family Violence:** In addition to serving as liaison to the GCFV as mentioned above, the staff in this division is managing grants related to family violence, including the Federal Office of Violence Against Women (OVW) and Criminal Justice Coordinating Council Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) grants. The OVW grant supports the DeKalb County Domestic Violence Court by supporting the costs of its coordinator and two legal advocates. The CJCC grant supports domestic violence courts throughout the state with training and follow up visits. This division has taken over the administration of civil legal services grants for victims of domestic violence with legal leadership on these grants provided by AOC attorney Christine Butcher and budget and compliance leadership provided by AOC Budget and Grants Compliance Officer, Ashley Garner.

Council of Superior Court Judges Report to Judicial Council April 2016

The Council of Superior Court Judges will meet for its semi-annual conference and continuing education seminars on St. Simons Island, Georgia, July 25-28, 2016. The conference will provide training seminars on such topics as judicial administration, including chief judge duties; case law updates; medical privacy laws; evidentiary issues in complex divorce cases; and several other divorce and custody related topics. Approximately 225 superior court judges and senior judges are expected to attend the conference. State Senator John Kennedy is expected to be the keynote speaker.

Over 20 active superior court judges did not qualify for re-election this year. Including those who have already retired, approximately 25 new judges will take office within the next year. For this reason, a special new judge orientation will be held in Athens for three days in December 2016.

CSCJ also elected new council officers to take office on May 1, 2016. Judge Horace Johnson will become President of the council. Judge Tripp Self will become President-Elect, and Judge Kathy Palmer will become Secretary-Treasurer.

Several new Administrative Judges will also take office this year. Judge Stephen Scarlett will become Administrative Judge for the First Judicial Administrative District; Judge Stephen Goss will become Administrative Judge for Second Judicial Administrative District; Judge Arthur Lee Smith, III will become Administrative Judge for the Third Judicial Administrative District; Judge Jack Partain will become the new Administrative Judge for the Seventh Judicial Administrative District; Judge Donald W. Gillis will become Administrative Judge for the Eighth Judicial Administrative District; and Judge Carl C. Brown will become the new Administrative Judge for the Tenth Judicial Administrative District. A new Administrative Judge will also be elected for the Sixth Judicial Administrative District.

Superior Courts now have over 100 accountability courts, with more planned to begin throughout the remainder of 2016. Currently, accountability courts are operating in 46 of 49 circuits.

Report of the Council of State Court Judges
Judicial Council Meeting
April 29, 2016

The Council has received great positive feedback since unveiling its online State Court Benchbook. The Chapter on *Appointing Qualified Interpreters* has been shared with the other Councils and the Georgia Council of Court Administrators. The Chapters will be updated within the next month by the several authors.

We concluded a very successful Legislative Session this year. DUI Accountability Courts were defined under a new Code Section: O.C.G.A. § 15-1-19 and misdemeanor probation practices and policies were updated as part of Governor Deal's Criminal Justice Reform initiative for 2016. Also, Electronic Filing of documents in state courts was authorized under Senate Bill 262. Senate Bill 255 updates the law on garnishments in Georgia in reaction to a decision by a federal district court judge in Atlanta.

One of the main contributors to this year's success with the General Assembly was the spirit of cooperation and hard work of the staff of each of the trial councils and the hard work of the staff of the Administrative Office of the Courts – in particular, Christine Butcher and Tracy Mason. The weekly telephone conferences and the sharing of resources and assistance was directly responsible for helping the Judicial Council to act with one powerful voice for all of us. Constant and open communications with our Director and those of the other Councils made all of us shine this year.

Rule 43 of the Uniform Rules for State Courts was recently approved and makes significant changes to the education requirements of judges and senior judges. Since its passage, we have cooperated with inquiries from other Councils who are also interested in making similar changes as they relate to senior judges.

We send congratulations to the Jonesboro High School Mock Trial Team. Coached for years by Chief Judge John Carbo of the State Court of Clayton County, the Jonesboro High School competed all the way to the State Championships and will compete in Boise, Idaho this May for the National Championship.

Of our 128 judges, 86 are up for election this year. Judge Morris Braswell of the Clayton County State Court recently took senior status. Judge Billy Folsom with Brooks County State Court; Judge Jack Carney with Bryan County State Court; Judges Melodie Clayton, Kathryn Tanksley, Irma Glover with Cobb County State Court; Judge George Floyd from

Decatur County State Court; Judge Charlie Wynne, Chief Judge of the Hall County State Court; and Judge Sid Esary with the Spalding County State Court will be retiring at the end of their terms this December.

Our Spring Conference will be from May 17th – 20th this year and much of our discussions will focus on the anticipated discussions this summer on misdemeanor sentencing along with enforcement of fines and fees in light of recent Department of Justice guidelines.

Judge Ben Brinson of Evans County will be sworn in as President with his term to begin June 1.



Council of Accountability Court Judges
Report to Judicial Council
April 2016

The Council of Accountability Court Judges (CACJ), in coordination with the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council, released the FY17 Accountability Court Grant Solicitation on February 15, 2016. The CACJ received a total 138 responses by the grant solicitation deadline date of March 25, 2016. The total amount of funds that were requested by the courts totals \$27,523,252.08. Within the total number of applications, there were forty-nine (49) Adult Felony Drug Court applications; twenty-eight (28) Mental Health Court applications; fifteen (15) Veterans Treatment Court applications; twenty-two (22) DUI Court applications; eleven (11) Family Dependency Treatment Court applications; and thirteen (13) Juvenile Drug and/or Mental Health Court applications. The CACJ Funding Committee is scheduled to meet on April 27 and April 28 to review applications and make grant award decisions. Further, the CACJ recognizes 131 established Accountability Courts within the State, and at this time, anticipates seven new courts opening their doors in FY17.

Additional Council updates include:

- The CACJ Training Committee and staff continue to work with the Institute of Continuing Judicial Education (ICJE) to plan and execute the Statewide Accountability Court Training Conference for September 2016. Additionally, the Training Committee has recommended the FY17 Accountability Training Calendar to the CACJ Funding Committee for consideration and approval. The CACJ will continue to provide evidence-based practice and treatment trainings to the courts; examples include: Risk/Need Assessment facilitation, Moral Recognition Therapy (MRT), National Drug Court Institute (NDCI) Tune-Up and Drug Court Planning Initiative training.
- The CACJ Standards & Certification Committee met on April 22, 2016 to review the Adult Felony Drug Court, and Mental Health Court certification applications in preparation for the CACJ Funding Committee meeting. Additionally, the Standards & Certification Committee is scheduled to meet on June 6, 2016, to review the Adult Felony Drug Court and Mental Health Court applications for re-certification.
- The CACJ Nominations Committee met on March 10, 2016 to begin preparation for the FY17 Executive Committee elections, and has a recommended FY17 ballot to present to the CACJ Executive Committee.
- The CACJ Executive Committee is scheduled to meet on May 23, 2016, at the State Bar of Georgia. The Committee will work to amend the Council's Constitution & By-Laws to account for HB 367, to include Family Dependency Treatment Court divisions, and OUI Court divisions within the membership of the Council. Additionally, the Executive Committee will prepare for the Council's annual meeting that is to be held in June 2016.
